Alameda schools are at a crossroads.

Over the last seven years, more than \$7 million in cuts have been made to our schools. State funding has become less and less reliable with the situation worsening this year in the face of the state budget crisis.

Superintendent Kirsten Vital and the Board of Education are creating a Master Plan that will define the direction Alameda schools will take over the next several years. They are inviting the Alameda community to participate in the discussion of the future of our schools.
