Master Plan Feedback: Master Plan Survey Results

Highlights

- •The latest Master Plan survey was posted on November 20. We have collected and analyzed results received between Friday, November 20 and Monday December 7.
- •As of December 7, there were 447 complete respondents to the on-line survey.

Highlights

The survey shows strong support for the first four "goals to take advantage of new opportunities," with large majorities strongly agreeing or agreeing with each goal:

Question 1 - Expand educational options (≈ 67%)

Question 2 - Redesign the central office and redirect funds to school sites (≈ 84%)

"Question 3 - Develop partnerships to augment revenue to fund new, innovative programs (≈ 89%) "Question 4 - Develop school-site instructional initiatives at every school (≈ 78%)

Highlights

- •The survey shows low support for the possible bonds listed, with significant majorities <u>strongly disagreeing</u> or <u>disagreeing</u> with each suggestion for a bond:

 Question 5 Modernize and expand capacity of <u>elementary</u> schools (≈ 60%)

 Question 6 Modernize and expand capacity of

- "Question 7 Modernize and expand capacity of existing high schools (≈ 65%)

Highlights

- For the possible "structural changes to reduce costs" (question #9), the top choice was increasing the number of inter-district students and the bottom choice was "reduce or eliminate flex space."
- For the "program goals and priorities given challenge to reduce costs" for elementary, the "spread" among the choices was relatively narrow, but the top choice was to protect P.E., the second was to protect music and the bottom was to protect art.

Highlights

•For the "program goals and priorities given challenge to reduce costs" for secondary, the "spread" among the choices was also relatively narrow, but the top choice was to protect A.P. classes, the second was to protect athletics, the second from the bottom was to protect 9th grade class size reduction and the bottom was to protect the middle school 7 period day (electives).

Highlights

•For the "program goals and priorities given challenge to reduce costs" for district-wide, the "spread" among the choices was also relatively narrow, but the top choice was to protect technology, the second was to protect library and media centers, the second from the bottom was to protect GATE, and the bottom was to protect Adult Education.
